“E-safety is a term which means not only the internet but other ways in which people communicate using electronic media, e.g. mobile phones, chromebooks. It means that you are protected from harm and the benefit from technologies without risk to yourselves and others.”

MEETING Meeting someone you have only been in touch with online can be dangerous. Only do so with your parents' or carers' permission and even then only when they can be present.



CEOP (Child Exploitation and Online Protection)

You can make a report on the CEOP website if you have any concerns about how someone has been communicating with you online.


