Subject Intent	In Citizenship in Year 9, Sunnydown students are taught about what the media is, the associated roles and responsibilities and the rules it is expected to follow; the vital role of the media in our democracy, including the duty to educate and inform; how the media holds people in power to account; fake news and the impact of sharing information that is false. Students are taught about what the law is and how it is changed; the difference between civil and criminal law; the role of Parliament in law making; the role of the youth court and how young people are treated within the Criminal Justice System; the age of criminal responsibility in the UK and globally. Money management is a key theme in Year 9: students are taught about financial responsibility, specifically around spending and saving; different ways in which we can purchase and pay for goods and services; budgeting; the implications of borrowing and how we can save.
