Changes to Attendance Codes

Further to the earlier ParentMail, a new Department for Education document has been released for all schools and this new guidance is in place for the new academic year (September 2024).

The main changes are a new set of codes for schools to use when authorising absence from school.

We will no longer be permitted to authorise holidays in term time as these are now deemed as not exceptional circumstances. On these occasions, we will be marking students as G, which is a holiday not authorised by the school. The other changes to codes are as follows:

New Authorised Absence Codes

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C (other authorised circumstances) has been replaced with:

- C1 leave of absence for participating in a regulated performance
 - C2 leave of absence for pupil subject to a part-time timetable

Y (not expected in school) has been replaced with:

- Y1 unable to attend due to transport normally provided not being available
- Y2 Unable to attend due to widespread disruption to travel
 - Y3 Unable to attend due to part of the school premises being closed
- Y4 Unable to attend due to the whole school site being unexpectedly closed
- Y5 Unable to attend as pupil is in criminal justice detention
- Y6 Unable to attend in accordance with public health guidance or law
- Y7 Unable to attend because of any other unavoidable cause

These codes are really just for schools and for the DfE to be able to correctly monitor student attendance more closely. You will not see any difference at school, just the way we report attendance.

We will still have our scheduled termly visits (targeted support meetings) from the Inclusion Service and these visits will look at our registers and the reasons for absence, along with trends and agreeing targeted actions. I will still be monitoring attendance each half term and we will continue to support families where attendance drops below 90%. Referrals to the Inclusion Service will only occur once we as a school have exhausted all avenues with families and we then feel that the involvement of the Inclusion Service would be beneficial.

I appreciate that there is a lot of information contained in this email, but you shouldn't notice any significant change as a parent.
