Connor Mason won the silver award at the National Unique Art Awards for his photography. The exhibition was held at The Patchworking Garden, a charity in Dorking for people with disabilities and mental health issues. After three hours he had sold nearly all his photos and raised £236 for Sunnydown School.

By way of another example, a child bringing alcohol to school or consuming it at school (or on school events) warrants immediate sanctions. All incidents are seen as a form of communication and an opportunity to learn.

This newsletter is being distributed to families of students who are likely to join us in Year 7 starting in September. To all of our new families, I extend a huge welcome. The transition offer from Primary School to Sunnydown starts with increasing communication and opportunities to visit to ensure each young man is as prepared as possible.
