Dear all who are associated with Sunnydown,

Congratulations and thank you - to the young men, to their families, to my relentlessly positive staff and the wider Sunnydown community. Trying to capture in words the pride I feel at the end of a unique half term, reflecting on what we have collectively achieved is difficult, because it is profound and immense.

You all should feel it too.

The way that each young man has adapted to and accommodated changes to our routine due to Covid-19 is clearly evident in their levels of active engagement with learning. Even when not able to be at school for one reason or another, students have logged into their classrooms via Google and participated, many of them in full school uniform. That sense of belonging is crucial right now, as always. That is not to say there have not been moments of bad language, of rudeness, of unnecessary online communications, of emotional meltdowns and challenging behaviours in response to requests made by adults. However, what has happened in these circumstances is young men have been able to learn from such experiences. These blips have not been the normal though - what has been normal is the high levels of engagement, of politeness, of homework completion, and of active learning. Congratulations young men.

The support demonstrated by families has also been clearly evident. From understanding the need to modify our finish times at the end of each day, to embracing the new lunch ordering system, to making payments for Chromebooks, to letters and emails of support during challenging times, to the Weekend Working Bee crew and the extended Friends of Sunnydown team, the support is appreciated.

None of which has been achieved however, is possible without the incredible staff team that we have grown and nurtured here at Sunnydown. Implementing the Covid Contingency Plan, extending our online Google education offer, undertaking additional before school, break and lunch supervision has presented its challenges. However, not only have staff managed these additional responsibilities, they have continued to supervise, educate and empathise with your sons. Their dedication and commitment to education in the holistic sense of the word is undiminished and to be applauded. Thank you.

The outcome of the combined efforts of students, families and staff, all working collaboratively and cooperatively, is a successful first half of autumn term. We are safe at Sunnydown. We learn at Sunnydown. Success and enjoyment for all involved is always enhanced when we work together. Our success in achieving this is echoed in the words of Mrs Sutandra Chaterjee.

In the absence of Mr Cybuch, we had the privilege of Mrs Chaterjee for the past two weeks delivering his lessons. Mrs Chaterjee has written to the staff saying that 'it was a pleasure to work with all for these last two weeks. Although the period is brief, I felt very included. And thanks to all of you who I have exchanged a smile, or talked to to get ready advice or for the spirit of camaraderie. You all make Sunnydown what it is.'

This week I write to identify two staffing changes. Both Mrs Woods (who works predominantly in Food Technology) and Mr Matthews (Maths) will leave Sunnydown at the end of the Autumn term. Much more will be said about both staff in subsequent communications, however, suffice to say that both have made a huge impact here at Sunnydown, and have contributed to its growth and development over many years. On behalf of the entire school community, I wish both Mrs Woods and Mr Matthews every success for the next stages of their respective careers.

The change of staff will cause some anxiety in some students. However, if we collectively remind one another that the standard of education has remained exceptional at Sunnydown over many years with many previous changes to staff and students, then all students can remain focussed on their learning. Perhaps reflecting on the sentiments in the opening page of this newsletter will help.

Of course with the departure of these staff, opportunities arise for others. An advertisement for a Maths teacher has already been published with interviews to take place after half term. Our intention is to fill both vacancies with the quality of education staff that we have become accustomed to here at Sunnydown.

On Monday evening this week I had the privilege of being joined by the boarders near the BBQ Hut for a small bonfire. Following their supper all of the students engaged in a treasure hunt, coordinated by Miss Kiddier. This area will continue to be transformed over half term in preparation for the DIY classes run by Mr Moody to complete some paving.

Returning to school in November, we have an Inset day on Monday 2nd November. Students return to school on Tuesday 3rd November, following the Monday timings. That is, students and taxis should arrive between 9.00am and 9.30am with students prepared to follow the subjects of a Tuesday timetable.

School Lunches - Autumn Second Half Term 2020

(Tuesday 3rd November - Friday 18th December 2020)

The cost of lunches for this half term is: £81.60 if not boarding

£50.40 if boarding Mon and Tues £49.35 if boarding Weds and Thurs

For full time boarders, we ask for a contribution equivalent to the cost of a school lunch (£2.40 per day = £81.60).

Payment can be made for the full half term, weekly (£12.00 per week) or on a daily basis (£2.40 per day).

Where there is a debit or credit on your account, you will receive an additional reconciliation letter. If you do not receive a letter, please refer to the amounts above. Payment should be made online via ParentMail.

We have been trialling a new system for paying for school lunches with some pupils. We are hoping to switch to this system after the Christmas break so will forward details to you nearer the time. The new system will allow you to see your individual balance on ParentMail and will alert you if your balance falls below a certain amount.

School Fund - All pupils are asked for a voluntary contribution of £10.00 per half term.

<u>Food Technology - All pupils</u> are asked for a contribution of £20.00 per term. This is available to pay for online under 'Consumables'.

Research Projects

At Sunnydown School, we are proud to be involved in research projects at leading universities and are pleased to be able to offer you that opportunity again. Researchers at King's College London are looking for autistic and non-autistic children (aged 10-16) to take part in a new study called C-MAPS, which aims to map children's profiles of cognition, motivation and attention. This research will help us to better understand children's social and emotional development and ultimately help those who might be experiencing difficulties.

For parents, it involves completing some short questionnaires, which are expected to take 20-30 minutes. For children, it involves trying out some interactive science activities online - these can be done in 1 or 2 separate sessions, both lasting around 30 minutes.

Children will receive tokens for a raffle to win Amazon vouchers (1 x £100, 5 x £50, 10 x £30). All families that take part will get an educational newsletter that explains why it's important to understand things like emotion and attention, and includes some fun science-themed activities for the whole family to do together!

Please have a look at the attached poster at the end of the newsletter. Please also have a read of the published document from the Journal of Child Psychology and Psychiatry, written by Researcher Dr Hannah Pickard, who conducted much of her research here at Sunnydown last year.
