Dear all who are associated with Sunnydown,

We had the privilege of a visit from Claire Coutinho, Parliamentary Under Secretary of State (Minister for Children, Families and Wellbeing) and MP for East Surrey today. Claire took time to speak with the Life Skills students, all of whom were excited to have their photograph taken with her. Some excellent questions regarding the inflation and energy crisis were raised by the students.



Over a warm drink in our very own BBQ Hut, in an area landscaped by our students, Claire engaged in conversations ranging from mental health support in schools, our concerns regarding access to CAMHS when needed, lack of funding reaching schools directly to accommodate the increase in staff wages and energy price rises, as well as our very broad and impressive curriculum. Claire also agreed to engage in a conversation with her colleagues about how the current Ofsted Inspection Framework is applied to Specialist Schools.

Mental Health and Emotional Wellbeing are important aspects of our lives always. Over the past several years, a noticeable increase in needs for support has been identified nationally. Here at Sunnydown, we recognised this and used our cycle scheme to create the **Caterham Cycle Challenge**. This challenge involves students cycling 660km around Kenley in a relay event with the aim of raising money for emotional wellbeing and mental health support.

Over the past two years we have raised in excess of £40,000: a huge achievement. Congratulations and thank you for your support. However, we recognise that this needs to continue but also increase. Therefore, in addition to the Caterham Cycle Challenge, three more events have been organised to complement the Cycle Challenge.

Firstly, we are taking two students to participate in **The Gibb Challenge** which involves cycling 660km across the remote part of Western Australia. This has been kindly sponsored by Gus Periscopes.

Secondly, the Friends of Sunnydown (FoS) are busy organising our very first **music event called SunnyFest for Saturday 3rd June, 2023 at Sunnydown**. A band made up of graduates from Sunnydown will feature among many other artists. A flyer is attached. Please promote this event as it is in conjunction with our Cycle Challenge, which aims to raise money and awareness of emotional wellbeing and Mental Health in our local community.

Finally the FoS have organised a **Golf Day for Tuesday 6**th **June, 2023 at Farleigh Golf Course** - a ParentMail has been sent with information about the upcoming Corporate Golf day. In addition, a flyer is being given to each student at taxi time today. Please promote the event as far and wide as possible. Money raised is invested in improving support for emotional wellbeing and mental health.

Strike Thursday 2nd March, 2023

At the moment and as the situation stands, all students are expected to attend school on Thursday 2nd March. Though this is a scheduled strike day, we are confident that we can accommodate all students. In accordance with National Guidelines published by the DfE, not all lessons will cover the National Curriculum. This will impact most greatly on Year 7, but some other classes as well. However, your son will be safe and well cared for, and will notice minimal impact on their timetable.

Trial changes to school day

As you will be aware, we trialled a slight change to the school day for a one week period from Monday 30th January to Friday 03rd February.

Our second trial starts next week from Monday 27th February to Friday 03rd March.

Parent, staff and student feedback will be gathered immediately after this to determine if we should explore a wider trial, try a different arrangement, stay the way we currently operate or adopt the new timings completely.

By way of reminder, the changed timings are at the end of this newsletter. It is so important that I remind everyone that there is no reduction in learning time for any student.

PSHE and **RSE** (Relationships and Sex Education)

Our very well planned PSHE and RSE curriculum is available on our website. Currently all students are considering Relationships and changes in our own bodies as we experience puberty.

I had the privilege of being invited to work with Year 8 on this topic this afternoon. Following this, I addressed the whole school on appropriate behaviours and conversations about relationships and our bodies. I made it clear, again,

that conversations about our body parts covered by our underwear are not appropriate during regular lessons, being yelled out along the corridor, or in the dining Hall. The appropriate place for appropriate conversations at school is during PSHE/RSE lessons. Should a young person have a genuine question that concerns them, about their sexual health, sexuality, their own development even; they have been encouraged to talk to a trusted adult at an appropriate time and place, and this includes our parents.

I reminded all students that physically touching another person in an area covered by our underwear without consent was considered as Sexual Violence and that as a school, we must explain that it is wrong. Further, we need to let families know that it has happened, and in some instances, will need to tell the police.

Regarding inappropriate comments and inappropriate touching, I made it clear that as a school, we cannot accept the suggestions that 'it is boys being boys' or 'the boys were only playing'. We are duty bound to respond to all such incidents so if necessary, would ask for your support when we do contact home to let you know of such behaviours from your son.

Relationships and Sex Education (RSE)

Some information was recently shared via ParentMail and mentioned in a newsletter about Consent.

The workshops we mentioned, with **Talk Consent** https://talkconsent.org/ have been arranged for Thursday 2nd March. This is a new service available to help educate our young people.

The organisers will also address Misogyny as an inappropriate behaviour and Andrew Tate as an inappropriate role model.

Risk Assessment Process 2022 - 2023

On Tuesday 21st, all parents received a Parent Mail which summarises our Risk Assessment process here at Sunnydown. Attached to this was also some information regarding the NSPCC PANTS Rule. By way of reminder, the Parent Mail is repeated below.

All staff at Sunnydown take our responsibility of helping to keep you son safe very seriously.

One way that we monitor whether your son may require some additional support is through a comprehensive Risk Assessment process. This is not new - the system was developed with the Care team many years ago. Over the years we have simply refined and enhanced it, incorporating any necessary updates to legislation, Safeguarding for example.

The complete process and all associated forms are available on our website. The attached letter serves as a summary of our process. Please note that this process is a supportive measure, it is an educational tool, not a sanction.

The processes and forms we employ at Sunnydown are designed to ensure the safety of all staff and students and to offer support in a targeted way, where we identify the need. These processes are constantly reflected upon; however, modifications to these forms and processes will occur annually during July in preparation for the following September.

This comprehensive Risk Assessment process is designed to help support your son, and keep him and all students and staff at Sunnydown safe, while helping them develop the skills to engage successfully in our wider community.

Your son's form tutor or a member of the Pastoral or SLT teams will make contact next week to discuss the current Risk Assessment we have for your son.

KS3 Homework schedule

Homework remains an integral part of life at Sunnydown.

Extensive research has shown that well planned, constructive homework, which is well marked and given appropriate feedback, is a great motivator. In addition, as a result of developing highly effective habits and routine, outcomes also improve. We have carefully thought about our approach to homework in order to enhance academic progress and, just as importantly, develop the life skills of organisation, resilience and independence. Additional research identifies the anxiety that Homework can induce in young people, particularly those who prefer to keep the worlds of school and home far apart. Managing this balance is something we reflect on often.

To achieve this, in Key Stage 3, we start introducing homework in Year 8 to ensure students do not become overwhelmed building up to several pieces a week in KS4. We give just one piece of homework per week in KS3 and the expectations in terms of time changes across the Key Stage, increasing even further in Years 10 and 11.

Year 8 - 20 mins per week

Year 9 - 30 mins per week

Your son may wish to do more than this. You may wish for your son to do more than this. However, as a school we are mindful of the impact of additional homework on young minds. We will not insist on additional work being done at home, beyond that set according to our schedule. Homework is given out and collected by the subject teacher.

If students have any queries about their homework, they should contact their subject teacher in the first instance and then their form tutor. We are aware that homework can cause unwanted anxieties at home with the students. This is obviously not our intention but should this occur we would urge you to contact the school as soon as possible so that we can find a way to support you as parents and to help the students to overcome any difficulties they may be encountering.

Resilience, Independence, Cooperation, and Effort (having a 'good go' at homework tasks) can be rewarded with a House Point.

Ollie: It was slightly better than football


Felix: I would prefer swimming to football. It was really good. Alfie: Absolutely amazing. They should definitely do it again
