Next week we return to Leiston Abbey for the Pro Corda fine and performing arts trip. A wonderful celebration of the multitude of talents, skills and interests of an array of young men, from across all years.

Today, Year 7N were working with Mr Moody, Miss Collings and Mrs Herring on the wallaby enclosure, then had an outdoor fire to cook bread and toast marshmallows. They rounded off their afternoon by helping to plant the wildflower garden which in turn will attract wildlife, including bees. We can then explore making our own honey.

On Wednesday evening I was with Miss Wood and Miss Newcombe in London at the Old Operating Theatre museum. This was the closing event for 'Sunnydown Synaptic,' a project involving world leading neuroscientists and creative talents working directly with your sons. The final installation will now be dismantled, but all of those who were present were incredibly complimentary of the quality of the work and the energy of our boys.

Last week a group of young men attended an afternoon tea to celebrate 25 years of fundraising by the Children with Special Needs Foundation. Returning at approximately 7pm, armed with a box of cakes, chocolate and a free mug, the boys thoroughly enjoyed the afternoon out. A highlight was the chocolate fountain!

English Pathway 2 Trip to the Charles Dickens Museum:
As documented by Thando Po-Ba

Our journey began upon departure from the school, in two minibuses. We made our way to Upper Warlingham train station, and after a wait, boarded the train to London Victoria Station. After navigating a complex web of underground train stations, we exited to the ground surface at Russell Square. It was at this point that our trip really began. A gentle jaunt through the quiet urban streets of central London led us to 48 Doughty Street: what was once the home of Charles Dickens. Almost immediately, we were acquainted with Richard, our tour guide. He then proceeded to take us on a fascinating sightseeing tour of the nearby area. He showed us houses, statues, and historical amenities – with each part receiving Richard’s special dose of wondrous historical knowledge.



When our short ramble came to an end, we enjoyed a pleasant lunch in Coram’s Fields, basking in the sweet sunlight. Afterwards, we went back to the museum, and branched off in two groups to go around the house with a tour guide. We were shown rooms such as the kitchen, bedroom, drawing room and more, with each room assembled as it would have been during the occupancy of Charles Dickens and his family. The tour was helpfully structured in a way as to focus particularly on Dickens’ novella ‘A Christmas Carol’, as that was what Pathway 2 had been studying.



By the time that the trip was drawing to a close, it was clear that the trip had imparted many relevant facts or two pertaining to our English studies. After a swift dash to retrace our steps to London Victoria, we were bundled into the train, and on our peaceful journey back to Caterham. Overall, it would only be proper to say that the trip had been very successful – both in its academic purpose and its fun day out objective – and we would collectively join to give a large thank you to Mrs Jensen, Mrs McCarthy, Mr Cassim, Miss Tomcova and many more.



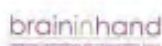
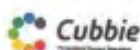
